



KAREN KLEMP'S MITERED TRIANGLE SHAWL

Materials Required:

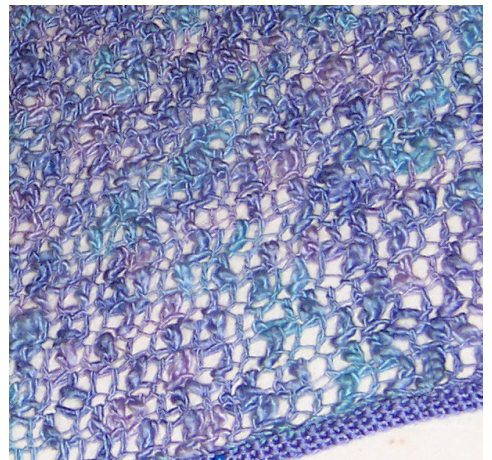
Brooks Farm Ellie (50% Fine Wool, 50% Silk Slub) 2 skeins (400 yds each), total of 800 yards

One ball of lightweight cotton yarn (such as Patons® Grace or Schachenmayr Catania) in contrasting color

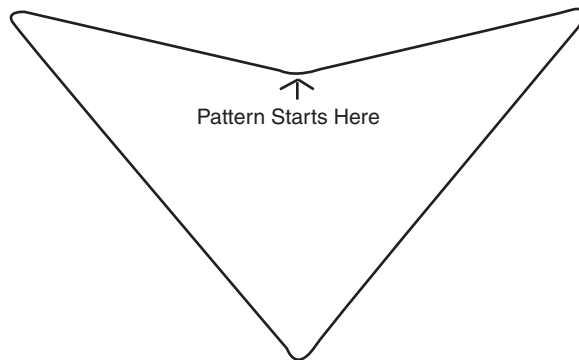
Crochet Hooks size M-13 (9 mm) for main body of shawl and size F (3.75 mm) for edging row. (Note, hook size can be adjusted to size to obtain gauge. Gauge is more important for determining the amount of yarn needed than fit. A large hook is preferable to let the thin/thick texture of the yarn show through.)

Gauge: 10 dc = 4 inches (2 rows dc = 1 inch)

Finished size of shawl: appx. 64" wide (along top edge) by 36" deep (from center of back neck to bottom point). If you plan to make your shawl larger than this, you will need additional yarn.



This shawl is worked from the middle back of the neck at the top in ever-widening mitered rows to form a triangle. It will look a little strange when you begin but will sit nicely on your shoulders because of the mitering.



Ch 4.

Row 1: 4 dc in 4th chain from hook. Turn.

Row 2: Ch 3 (counts as first dc in each row); 2 dc in 1st st (right where you formed the chain 3), dc in next dc, 5 dc in next dc (place marker in 3rd one of these to indicate center of row and keep moving it up to the next row), dc in next dc, 3 dc in top of beginning chain. Turn.

Row 3: Ch 3; 2 dc in 1st dc, 1 dc in each st to and including dc before marker; work shell in center marked stitch, (replace marker in 3rd st of shell), 1 dc in each st, ending with 3 dc in top of turning chain. Turn.

Rows 4, 5 & 6: Repeat Row 3.

Row 7: Ch 3; dc in 1st st, dc in ea st to center, 3 dc in center st, dc in ea st to end, 2 dc in top of turning chain. Turn.

Alternate Rows 6 and 7 until shawl is the size you want.

Edging row is worked with a lighter weight, smooth yarn and a smaller crochet hook. You may need to go up or down a hook size to get the stitches to lay smoothly.

Edging Row 1: Attach new yarn. Ch 1, work 2 sc in each stitch across. In the five stitches that make the corner, work 3 sc, 2 sc, 3 sc, 2 sc, 3 sc. Join to first sc with a slip stitch.

Edging Row 2: Ch 1, work 2 sc in each stitch across. In the center stitch of each corner, work 3 sc. Join to first sc with a slip stitch.

Edging Row 3: Repeat Edging Row 2. Fasten off and weave in ends.

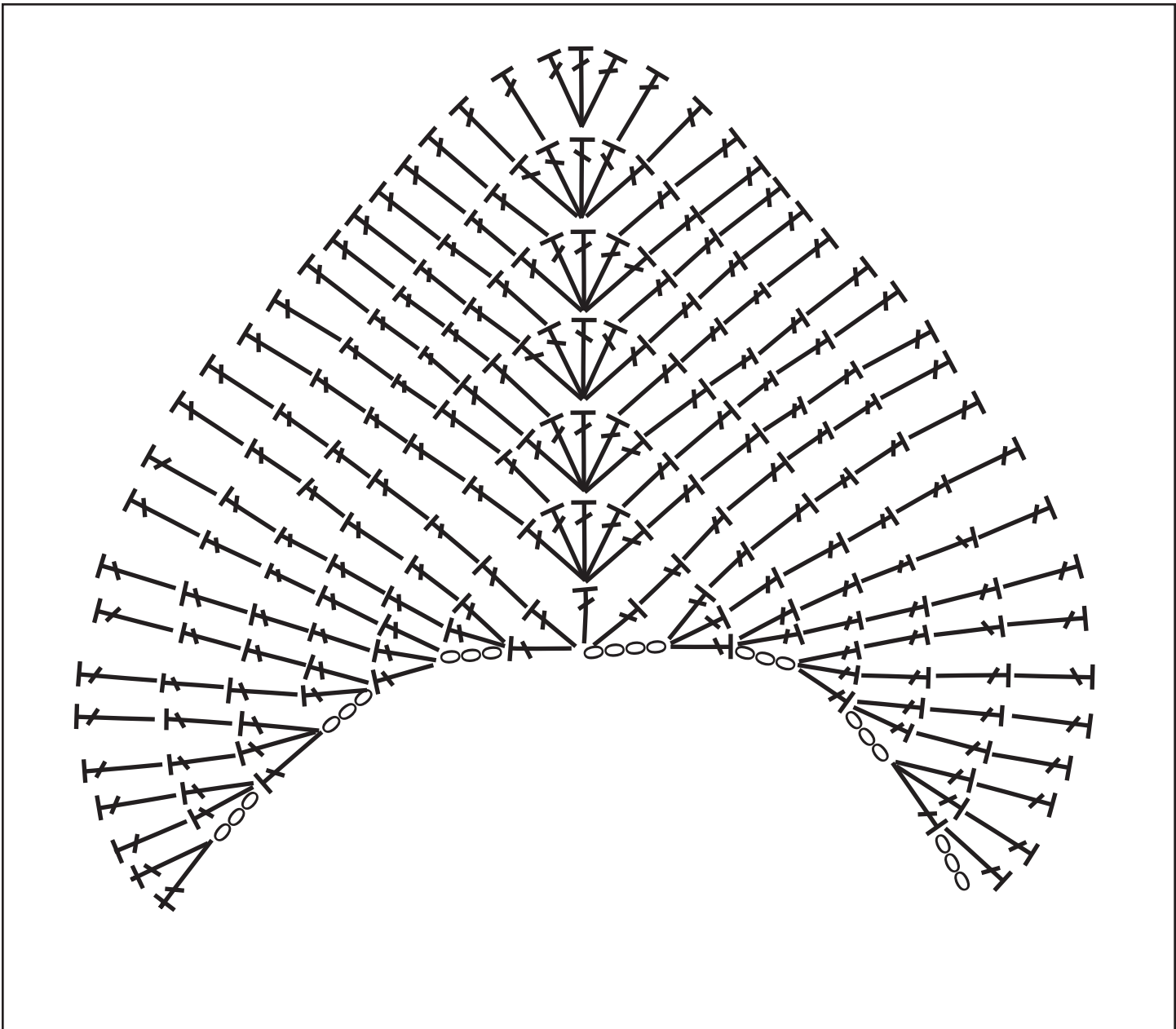
